



Pink Class


Pink Class have had a fantastic start to S1, settling in well at Pilrig Park School. We have enjoyed getting to know each other, building new routines and making the most of the Autumn sunshine! Alongside this, we have been exploring fairytales through STEM challenges, focusing first on The Billy Goats Gruff. We demonstrated fantastic teamwork as we built new bridges for the goats out of different resources. We also enjoyed using our creativity to make trolls out of card, paper and chalk! Next, we will be looking at The Three Little Pigs, learning about the strengths and weaknesses of different materials.


In Literacy, we have been focusing on learning the first set of core words, through a range of songs, stories, videos and signs. We have also explored enjoyment and choice, using the front cover and blurb to choose a story to listen to. Using Aided Language Boards to support us, we have shared our opinions of a range of texts. As a class, we have been reading the short novel 'Adventure Mouse: Otter Chaos!' and have been challenged to make predictions about what could happen in the next part of the story. We are excited to see what will happen to Pedro and his gang of friends at the end of the book!

In Numeracy, we have been learning about number processes and measuring time. Through regular 'Estimysteries', we have developed our estimating skills, using pictures and clues to help us to find out how many objects there are in each task. Using songs and random dot patterns, we have practised our counting skills to develop number sense and fluency. Alongside this, we have explored analogue and digital clocks and worked on telling the time. We have become quite competitive playing a Maths Frame telling the time game on the class Smartboard!


In Health and Wellbeing, we have started the New Horizons programme, focusing on the first section about our personal details. We have collected information about ourselves and shared it with the class, including our likes and dislikes and our families. Next, we will be using digital maps to explore our local community, identifying the different amenities that we would like to visit.



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Blue Class

Blue Class have had a wonderful start to the school year! We have been busy settling back into our routines and exploring lots of new learning. This term, we've been learning all about dressing appropriately for different types of weather. We played games to help us choose the right clothes for sun, rain, and snow, and practiced important independence skills, like fastening zips all by ourselves.






For our topic, we enjoyed the story of *Goldilocks and the Three Bears*. The class got creative by making and decorating their own clay porridge bowls and designing bear puppets out of wooden spoons to act out the story. Everyone worked so hard, and the results were fantastic!









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In Social Subjects, we have been learning about voting and making choices. We practiced making group decisions together and even held our own election to choose an 'Energy Monitor,' who helps us remember to save energy in the classroom. We have also been choosing jobs to help tidy the playground which links in with our responsibilities as ECO Committee members.

Yellow Class

It has been a very busy start to the new school year. We have settled into new routines well and are learning all sorts of new skills!



In Digital Literacy we are learning about passwords and have been practicing signing into the iPads with increasing independence. All the boys have enjoyed exploring a variety of apps and games and we are looking forward brushing up our digital skills as the year progresses!





In LifeWise we have been learning all about 'Doing Our Laundry'. We have sorted washing by colours, loaded the washing machine, learnt about using soap and which buttons to press for getting the washing machine to run.

Once the washing was done we then learnt about unloading the washing machine, hanging up the laundry – inside and outside, folding up the clothes and pairing socks! We are getting really confident at these tasks – I'm sure these skills can easily be used to help out around the house!











In Outdoor Learning we have been focusing on The Environment and what we can do to improve our school environment. We decided to make hanging planters.



We recycled bottles to make our planters. We then filled them with stones and then soil. We chose to plant peas so they can climb up to the strings! Also, peas are a favourite vegetable in Yellow Class! We enjoyed using the magnifying glasses to look the stones, the soil and the pea seeds. We have also planted apple seeds which are growing very well! We definitely have green fingers!

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Orange Class


Orange Class are getting on great so far in Fifth Year and are enjoying the responsibility of setting a good example for the younger pupils around the school.



We also tried our best with the first Taskmaster challenge.




Orange Class have done really well so far this year.



Here are photos of Pink Class playing the tambourine and White Class playing the shaky eggs.






The Choir has started up again this year! We have many new recruits and are currently working on our theme song for the year, "This Is Me", and preparing for some more Christmas singing!

Purple Class are working hard on their keyboard skills, and some pupils are beginning to explore playing with both hands.



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
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In the Art Room!

The focus for the BGE classes this term has been line, pattern and a dash of colour!





Green Class has been making some gold masks to use as trophies in our monthly 'Taskmaster Challenge', and as part of our Rights Respecting Gold Award journey.











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
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P.E.

Home Economics

BGE

This term in Home Economics we have been learning new skills and building on others.

Our lessons have been looking at where food comes from, seasonal produce and kitchen hygiene.

We have also been looking at what bacteria does at different temperatures, and what we need to do to keep the kitchen clean. We made playdough and our own germs for an interactive lesson on the Germometer and made our own display. This has helped reinforce the importance of washing hands and food storage.

We have been learning if food comes from a plant or animal and then what kind of plant and which animal , which the pupils enjoyed. We discuss this in each practical lesson to help our students remember the theory aspects we have covered.

We made crumble using seasonal produce of apples and blackberries, Gruffalo Crumble. Lots of the blackberries were collected by our pupils in the playground with Ms Sawyer and Ms Morrison.

The BGE pupils also got to try out our new air-fryers while baking their rolls they made and transferred their kneading skills to also making scones and biscuits for our latest family event.











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Senior phase

The senior phase classes have been working towards their new qualifications for this year. We have both ASDAN and SQA courses across S4 - S6.

Green Class have been working with the air-fryers focussing on both baking and making a healthy meal.

Red Class are working on Food, Health and Wellbeing this term. They are currently focussing on Food for Health, Preparation and Independent Living Skills.

Orange Class are working on Practical Cookery. They have completed their assessment for one unit and are working towards completing their next assessment. The class are also working on an ASDAN course for Personal Development where they have written a story book for communication and are now completing a module to help the school community (a gardening task).

Whilst most of Ness Class are at college this term, 2 pupils are in school working on a unit at National 5 level, which we hope to complete by Christmas. The whole class comes together again later in the week and we are focusing on baking.









We finished off before the October break with our 'Meet the Staff' event. All classes contributed to the food offered to everyone on Wednesday 8th October. Thank you to all classes for their help, everyone was very impressed.







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DYW - Developing the Young Workforce



With the support of Camilla, our allocated DYW coordinator, Pilrig Park School pupils have opportunities to connect them with employers so that our young people develop the skills needed for the world of work.







This term, a group of senior pupils went to find out all about the well-known company, Pizza Express. The group travelled by tram / minibus to the restaurant in Ocean Terminal where Charlie explained about the company.







Next was the really fun bit - a chance to make your own margherita pizza! Everyone was shown how to spread the tomato sauce onto the dough base, and top off with lots of cheese! Whilst the pizzas were cooking in the pizza oven, Charlie told them lots of fun pizza facts!



Our pupils had great fun making and eating their pizzas and even brought some back for the office to enjoy!















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Scran Van Returns!



We are delighted to welcome back the SCRAN Van with Jamie and Caitlin!

A few senior pupils are involved in the opportunity to take part in SCRAN Van cooking sessions, this term.

Jamie and Caitlin provide confidence-boosting, skill-building cooking slots on the van, proving that classrooms come in all shapes and sizes! Our young people are also learning team work as well as culinary tips whilst making pastry and ganache chocolate tarts! It's a very practical way to teach pupils the transferrable skills they need for life and work.









Come Alive

This term we have introduced a new activity on Monday mornings called *Come Alive!* The name comes from a song in *The Greatest Showman*, which is our theme for the year, and probably gives a clue of what the end of year show may be!!



Outdoor Learning

On Wednesday 10th September, pupils from Red and Purple Classes were invited to take part in the first **Outdoor Learning Challenge Day** run by Edinburgh City Council along with partner providers and Edinburgh University. It was a brilliant opportunity to meet new people, try new activities and practice some of the skills we have been learning in Outdoor Learning. There were lots of schools there taking part in a wide range of activities, from archery to drumming!

We were lucky enough to take part in three different activities during the morning. The first was a brilliant den building activity. We got the chance to make two different shelters and have a relaxing time in the hammocks that were set up. We had great fun trying to get the ropes over the tree branches and get the tent pegs hammered into the ground!







The next activity was tent building. This time we didn't need to use trees, but the tents were much smaller, only one of us could fit in at a time. There were some quite tricky instructions to follow, and we had to work as a team but both groups managed to build the tents and try them out for size!



Our final acitivty was learning all about trees. We learnt how to measure the height of a tree using our bodies, we did enjoy having to walk and then look upside down through our legs to see the top of the tree! This process also involved some careful counting. We then learnt about the different species of trees that were growing in that area and how we can identify them by looking at the leaves. It was fun naming the trees – Steve being our favourite!








All in all it was a brilliant morning. We cannot wait to continue with our Outdoor Learning curriculum and build on the skills we learnt during this exciting trip.





This school year, the Speech and Language Therapy Team at Woodlands and Pilrig Park Schools would like to invite you <u>together</u> to a series of 4 online workshops. These workshops are to support your young person's understanding, communication and regulation. You can join as many of these workshops as you want.

The first workshop will be on 'Using Visual supports in the Home Setting'.

Dear Parent/Carer

In June 2025, a team of inspectors from Education Scotland visited Pilrig Park School. During our visit, we talked to parents/carers and young people and worked closely with the headteacher and staff.

The inspection team found the following strengths in the school's work.

- Under the strong strategic leadership of the headteacher, staff have established a nurturing school culture underpinned by positive relationships and children's rights. Young people feel safe, cared for and enjoy learning.
- Staff work very well together to support young people with their learning. They know young people very well and are highly responsive to their needs.
- Young people in S4-S6 are gaining an extensive range of qualifications and awards. The school is providing young people with very good opportunities to achieve well across a wide range of subjects.
- Across the school, young people's personal achievements are recognised and celebrated very well. As a result, they are gaining accreditation for their achievements and are growing in confidence.

The following areas for improvement were identified and discussed with the headteacher and a representative from The City of Edinburgh Council.

- Senior leaders and staff should continue to improve the school's approaches to learning and teaching. Staff should ensure that young people are sufficiently challenged with their learning at all times.
- Senior leaders and staff should work together to continue to streamline how they plan learning for young people. They should use information to set clear learning targets that allow young people to develop further appropriate skills and make progress.



We gathered evidence to enable us to evaluate the school's work using quality indicators from <u>How good is our school?</u> (4th <u>edition</u>). Quality indicators help schools, local authorities and inspectors to judge what is working well and what needs to be improved. Following the inspection of each school, the Scottish Government gathers details of our evaluations to keep track of how well Scottish schools are doing.
